WOODSTOCK

Let me take you back to August 1969 when a three day event of peace and music changed rock and roll. Rolling Stone magazine listed Woodstock as #19 of the 50 moments that changed the history of rock and roll.

Woodstock was a musical festival held on Max Yasgur's dairy farm in Bethel, NY August 15 - 18. Thirty two acts performed amid spordiac rain.

Four men organized the event. John Roberts, Joel Rosenman, Artie Komfeld and Michael Lang. The oldest organizer was 27 at the time.

Tickets for the event were printed. 1 day - \$7.00, 2 days - \$13.00 and 3 days - \$18.00. These tickets were sold mail order or sold at certain stores.

The first problem the organizers ran into was location. Citizens in Wallkill did not want drunk, drugged-out hippies running through the town. On July 2 a statute was passed that banned the concert from being held there. A new venue had to be found and quickly. Max Yasgur offered up his 600 acre dairy farm. New contracts and permits had to be drawn up.

Construction of a stage, performers pavilion, parking lots, concession stands, and a children's playground had to be accomplished. The original 50,000 grew to 200,000 and more. Toilets, food, and water had to be brought in. Two days before the festival actually began


50,000 people were already camped in front of the stage.

Unfortunately due to large gaps in the fencing, many people just walked through without a ticket. The organizers were then forced to make it a free concert. After that announcement was made one million people headed to Bethel. Concert goers abandoned their cars and used the highways as a parking lot, and walked to the stage area. The traffic was so bad that performers had to be brought to the stage by helicopter.

Some of the performers that appeared were Richie Havens, Joan Baez, Woody Guthrie, Santana, Grateful Dead, CCR, Janis Joplin, The Who, Jefferson Airplane, Joe Cocker, Blood, Sweat and Tears, Crosby, Stills, and Nash, and Jimi Hendrix.

Although the concert was a great success, the organizers lost over 1 million dollars.

Woodstock has become synonymous with the hippie counterculture - sex, drugs, and rock and roll.
